Your Say on Sexual Health Services

Healthwatch Newham successfully held a 'Have your Say' Sexual Health Services Information and Workshop event with local black male residents.

The event was held at Forest Gate Hotel, 25th February, 6pm - 8pm, and was focused on black males due to research that suggests black males, especially young black males are a key and underrepresented group receiving sexual health care.

Twelve participants attended the event to take part in two workshops discussions - rating local services/establishing gaps in service provision, and how people could be better engaged with in order to increase uptake of local sexual health services.

Jake Bayley - Sexual Health Consultant at Barts Health NHS Trust, and Teresa Fisher - Health Promotion Officer at Widows and Orphans International, also provided presentations, at the event, outlining Newham sexual health services and local sexual health outreach activities, respectively.

Barts Health NHS Trust in Special Measures

Barts Health NHS Trust has been placed in special measures by the NHS Trust Development Authority, following a Care Quality Commission report into Whipps Cross Hospital, which found it to be "inadequate".

The trust, which runs six hospitals including Newham and Whipps Cross, reported a £93 million deficit last month.

Dr Ron Singer, chairman of campaign group Newham Save Our NHS, said: "There is now increased concern regarding the significant funding pressures Newham will now face."

"As Newham campaigners our job is to support Newham Hospital in terms of its ability to serve the people of Newham and beyond. We are very aware of the demoralising affect on staff and will do all we can to help."

The report, carried out in November last year, highlighted that significant improvements were required to urgent and emergency services, medical care, surgery, services for children and young people, end of life care and outpatients at Whipps Cross Hospital.

It also found staff morale to be low and concerns over a culture of bullying and harassment.

Barts Health Trust executive Peter Morris, who announced he was stepping down last month, said the trust was "sorry for the falings" identified in the report.

He said: "Barts Health is committed to ensuring the safety and welfare of every one of its patients. This report describes services that fall a long way short of what we aspire to. We are very sorry for the failings identified by the CQC in some of our services at Whipps Cross and we know the trust has a big challenge ahead."

"The special measures regime is designed to aid service improvement by providing help and support where it is most needed. It has worked well with NHS organisations in other parts of the country and I am confident it will work here."



Newham Hospital A&E consistently meets targets

Since 19th February, three senior staff members have stepped down including Peter Morris, chief nurse Kay Riley and trust chairman Sir Stephen O'Brien.

The Care Quality Commission has yet to report on the quality of services offered at Newham University Hospital.

Dr Zuhair Zarifa, chair of NHS Newham Clinical Commissioning Group, said: "Newham University Hospital's performance has been consistently above the target of 95% of patients not waiting longer than four hours in A&E. The latest Friends and Family Test from December 2014 shows that 91.2% of patients at Newham would recommend the hospital.

We welcome the approach to strengthened site management on the Whipps Cross site and we will be working with the Trust to ensure that a similar approach is adopted for the Newham University Hospital site.

We are working in partnership with Barts Health, patients, local councils, Healthwatch and other key stakeholders to develop a strategy for east London that will transform the way we care for patients; preventing ill health and supporting people to live healthier lives." More

It says 'A lot of work has been done over the last two and a half years to improve the lives of people with mental health needs, learning disability and autism and to realise the vision of everyone being treated with dignity and respect by health and care services and enjoying the same rights as anyone else. However we have to go further. Darren Morgan talks to Jade Sempare - Healthwatch Newham's 'Disabilities Ambassador'.

You Can Do It!

All too often, disabled people find themselves in voluntary work, not through choice but through circumstances. Jade urges those in this position to consider 'I have skills in this... and I want to become that' and to pursue those aspirations. You don't have to do it alone and may be able to get assistance on things such as training and equipment.

When Jade was first diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis she thought 'I'll be on benefits for the rest of my life', but through determination, vision, and the assistance that is available, Jade has a number of very important and worthwhile roles. 'We can achieve our goals of we put our minds to it!'

Seeing Through the Gloss...

Jade says that we have the ability to 'see things how we want, not how we're conditioned to by the pink ribbons and bubbles of the commercials on television and in magazines'. She urges us to appreciate reality, and to feel comfortable to see and deal with things as they really are.

Getting Care Right!

Jade says it's so important to get the right care. She isn't that keen on the label 'carer' though, suggesting 'personal assistant' as a better fit. She says the word 'carer' can sometimes be belittling for disabled people, who after all, don't want to be cared for really, just assisted!

World's Largest Community Genetics Study

East London Genes & Health, the world's largest community based genetics study, has launched, aiming to improve health among people of Pakistani and Bangladeshi heritage in East London by analysing the genes and health of 100,000 local people.

Led by Queen Mary University of London (QMUL) and supported by £4m in funding from the Wellcome Trust and MRC, researchers will study the genetic code and medical records of local South Asian people - with the aim of improving understanding of the links between genes and environmental factors in causing disease.



Tower Hamlets and Newham have 'lowest life expectancy'

These findings will then contribute to improving healthcare and the long-term prevention and treatment of a number of diseases particularly affecting local communities and the wider population, such as heart disease and diabetes.

East London boroughs, Pakistani and Bangladeshi communities in particular, have some of the highest rates of poor health in the UK. For example:

Pakistani men have the highest rate of heart disease in the UK and the risk of dying early from heart disease is twice as high among South Asian groups compared with the general population; People from South Asian communities are five times more likely to have type 2 diabetes than the general population; Tower Hamlets and Newham have the lowest life expectancy of all London boroughs.

From 1st April 2015, care and support in England is changing. The new Care Act will introduce a number of reforms that primarily impact existing and new care users, their carers and families. The new Care Act will help make care and support more consistent across the country. The new national changes are designed to put people in control of the help they receive.

Anyone currently receiving care, or supporting an adult family member or friend as an unpaid carer, could be affected by the national changes being introduced by the Care Act.

The new Care Act has been passed to make care and support, and the way we pay for it, clearer, easier to access and more consistent across the country.
